

## VILLAGE GROUPS' REPORTS - STAPLEHURST ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 11<sup>th</sup> MAY 2015

### **FRIENDS OF STAPLEHURST HEALTH CENTRE**

This past year has been a successful one for the Friends, and also for the Health Centre as a whole. As the new contract for the provision of GP services has bedded in, both staff and patients have felt the benefit of a more secure, long term future. There are still concerns of course, but there always will be. That is certain with diminishing funding for the NHS and increasing demand as the patient population gets older. We can feel this in Staplehurst, most acutely in the hospital system – including Accident and Emergency services. We are lucky here in Staplehurst to have a modern building with plenty of room, and a forward looking organisation in Malling Health to look after us.

We have published four newsletters which are distributed with the Parish Council's village update.

We participated in National No Smoking Day, and as in former years, we publicised and helped to run the annual flu jab sessions, and encouraged those eligible to have the shingles jab too. Also as usual, we sold our Christmas raffle tickets at the flu jab sessions.

We assisted the Practice Manager with the production of a new, up to date Practice Information leaflet for new and other current patients.

We have held four information evenings, all of which were well attended:

- Dr Rumfeld gave an interesting talk on 'A day in the life of a GP', describing his typical work schedule. He also explained a number of issues concerning appointments and prescriptions.
- Barbara Hagen from Maidstone and Malling Carer's Project spoke about the support available for those caring for patients.
- Gary Vaughan, Business Development Manager at Benenden Hospital gave a presentation on Benenden Healthcare, the hospital and what they do. This included a brief history of the hospital, the contract with the NHS for bookable procedures and the 'choose and book' scheme they run with specialist consultants.
- Ian Ayers, Chief Executive of the NHS West Kent Clinical Commissioning Group spoke to us in October. He explained what the CCG does and how it

commissions GP and certain other services for the public. A lively question and answer session followed.

### **POPPY'S DAY NURSERY & POPPY'S BABY CARE UNIT**

Poppy's Day Nursery established in 2008 continues to provide 'full day' care for 50 weeks of the year; open Monday to Friday from 07:30hrs to 18:30hrs. We currently have 75 children 'on role' caring for 34 children a day most of whom are from Staplehurst.

Our Headcorn Road site holds a '**Good**' Ofsted rating for children aged 2yrs to 5yrs following an Inspection on 11<sup>th</sup> April 2014.

Our Baby Care Unit for children aged 3months to 2yrs located in the High Street also holds a '**Good**' Ofsted rating in Early Year's provision in all areas and '**Outstanding**' in the 'extent to which children make a positive contribution'. For more info see <http://www.Ofsted.gov.uk>.

We have 17 members of staff most live locally including one volunteer. Two new members of staff trained last year under the "apprentice scheme in childcare" supported through "Parenta" have now both qualified and are employed at Poppy's.

We continue to provide opportunities for students from Angley School, Mid Kent College and West Kent College who come to us for childcare experience within the nursery setting.

We access KCC courses to develop staff in all areas of nursery care; this has included leadership and management courses. All staff are trained in Paediatric First Aid.

Last July thirteen of our children left for Primary School. We held a princesses and pirates leavers' party, a very proud day for parents and staff alike. This year nineteen children will be leaving for Primary School.

We hold our Annual Nursery Birthday Party in August for families of the children, and will celebrate our seventh birthday this year.

During the last year we held events raising funds for the Wishing Well charity, Children in Need and Red Nose Day.

We continue to maintain a partnership with Pre-Schools, have links with the Library and the Primary school.

## **SPEED WATCH**

We were delighted with the number of new volunteers that were trained at two sessions held in Staplehurst. We hope that more of them will be able to come out and join in the roadside observations in the lighter and warmer weather.

Our activity has been hampered by weather and other constraints, but the general reaction when we are in action is positive. Motorists do take notice and are reminded to slow down when travelling through our village. Each speeder has their details recorded and forwarded to the Kent Police database. If they are a second time offender within twelve months then a letter of advice is sent. If this is ignored and further recordings of this vehicle are made anywhere in Kent then stronger letters follow with a visit from a uniformed officer quite possible. For those vehicles exceeding the speed limit by 50% or more (45mph in the 30mph zone) a very strongly worded letter is sent straight away, followed with further action if necessary.

More activity by our team will make more visits from uniformed officers more likely. The more evidence we gather the safer our roads will be. Ask the Clerk how you can join in.

### **STAPLEHURST FOOTPATH GROUP**

In May 2014 our annual Blossom Walk of five miles commenced from Linton Church, heading east through Boughton Monchelsea. Good views of the Weald were enjoyed from the Greensand Ridge. Our June walk of six miles started from Cranbrook town centre heading south through the Fright to Netter's Hall Farm, returning via Swattenden.

Our Longest Day Walk in June, commenced from Horsmonden village green. This evening walk terminated with a drink at the Gun & Spitroast. At the Staplehurst Carnival & Fete the group held a fundraising stall where we were able to promote our walking activities.

July saw the group undertake a five and a half mile walk commencing at West Malling. The circular route headed north to Addington church, returning past Offham church, St. Leonard's Tower and Manor Country Park, where the group enjoyed afternoon tea. In August the five mile walk commenced from Smarden village and headed out to Dering Wood and Maltman's Hill, returning via Wissenden and Romden.

A longer walk of six and a half miles was enjoyed in September, when the group walked from Benenden church, via the grounds of Benenden School into Hempstead Forest. The walk ended with a welcome drink at the local pub. The group travelled to Winchelsea for the October walk of five miles. The walk started from St. Thomas's church and headed west across fields to Wickham Manor. The route continued up past Hog Hill Mill, returning south to Pannel Farm Nature Reserve and along the Royal Military Canal.

November's walk was local, commencing from Staplehurst church. The route went out to Frittenden via Iden Manor Farm and Gould Farm, returning to All Saints along

the Ridge. Our Christmas Walk was also local, commencing at The Parade and heading out to Chickenden, returning to Staplehurst for mince pies and mulled wine.

The New Year commenced with a well-attended local walk of five miles to the southwest of Staplehurst, when fine weather enabled good views from The Ridge. Our February walk of five miles explored the footpaths to the north of Staplehurst. The walk headed north and west from Staplehurst Station before crossing the A229 and returning via Fisher's Farm.

Our March walk returned to Linton for a walk through the orchards along the Greensand Ridge. After a stop at Hunton church, we returned uphill to Linton. The April walk of five miles was through Scotney Castle Estate. The fine weather attracted our best attendance of the year!

Staplehurst Footpath Group was founded in 1976. Non-members are welcome to join our walks. Membership is just £1 per family per year, or you can purchase sets of our Local Walk Cards, obtainable from Staplehurst Library.

Sensational Kids club – This club is for primary aged children with special needs, their siblings and parents/carers. There are a variety of sensory toys, craft activities and space for the young ones to let off steam in the main hall with bikes, scooters and footballs. A great time is had by all!

Sing-a-long Club – We run this for adults with learning difficulties and their carers. After singing our hearts out in between bouts of laughter and banter, we rest up with tea and cakes before ending with an amusing game together that involves more singing! We greatly value the relationships we continue to build with our friends at the local homes.

Services at Sobel Lodge/Iden Manor/Abbotsleigh/Woodlands Villa – We visit weekly (offering varying types of support from painting rooms, cleaning out fish tanks to spiritual support and guidance). We also run monthly services where the residents help lead the services as we sing favourite hymns, share a short bible message and catch up together.

Cedars (Over 50s Group) – The varied programme includes interesting speakers, activities, afternoon tea, outings and a super-sized Christmas lunch! A great opportunity to make new friends.

Badminton Groups – We run several badminton groups of mixed ages and ability so all can join in regardless of experience. We also have spare rackets as well for those that want to give it a go!

Market Church – We continue to run this down at the Sunday market from Easter to October. Providing a chance to hand out free literature, catch up with people and pray with those requesting it. We also enjoy catching up with the local store holders and see the array of things they sell.

Happiness Course – This proved very popular, with some significant success stories, as we explored the science and research behind happiness.
